VISTA Wins Award!

VISTA is in the Weeds!

"Weeds and invasive plants impact the world around us and our daily lives. They can reduce crop yields, choke waterways, trigger allergies, disrupt the natural habitats of plants and animals, create fire and safety hazards, and reduce aesthetic and property values."- Weed Science Society of America

WEEDS! They're everywhere we look because they love our Florida climate. Anyone at VISTA who uses a bed to grow vegetables or flowers knows that they should be keeping their bed free of weeds. BUT- all of us are also responsible for keeping the surrounding pathways of our beds free of weeds too. This job is yours, and not the responsibility of our student volunteers. Each time you are at VISTA, take a look around your bed. See a weed, pull a weed. In addition, if you see soil peeking through the mulch in the pathways around your bed, get some mulch from the mulch pile in the concrete bin and cover the pathway.

What to do with the weeds and any other green trimmings you cut? Either take them home to your yard waste if they are flowering or producing seeds or, if they have no flowers or seeds, scatter them (singly, not in clumps) onto the green common area far away from the vegetable and flower gardens, as well as our native plant landscapes. (VISTA has no trash or yard waste pick up.)

PLEASE- Do your part to keep all our pathways weed-free and covered with mulch!

"Salt and Pepper" (of a sort) Grows in our Wildflower Garden!



Can you see how this plant got the name *Salt and Pepper*? Rick Jackson photographed a **Fiery skipper** (*Hylephila phyleus*) nectaring on one of its blooms.

One of 4 Dwarf Snow Squarestem (*Melanthera nivea*) shrubs in VISTA's Wildflower Garden, below. This plant grows in full sun and partial shade, thrives in loam, sand, or even soil composed of lime rock. It blooms during warm weather months. Drought tolerant once established, Snow Squarestem serves as a wonderful nectar plant for a wide diversity of butterfly species and other important pollinators that support our vegetable gardens.

Gardener Highlight



Janet Stanko gardens in CW2 and is Chair, VISTA's Pond Committee

What is your favorite crop?

Kale! I grow a lot of it. Although it isn't my very favorite, broccoli is also great. Did you know that broccoli leaves are as nutritious as the broccoli head itself?

How does your time at VISTA feed your soul?

After gardening organically for many years, I wanted to be involved in an effort bigger than myself to make a broader statement about sustainable gardening. Also, I have learned much more along the way.

What do you cook up with your harvest?

I recently made Zuppa Toscana which is an Olive Garden recipe using a lot of chopped kale. I add kale to my smoothies.

What new information/learning have you acquired as a result

of gardening at VISTA?

I learned more about soil maintenance and the importance of protecting the soil. In addition, my knowledge of native plants has increased because of presentations and conversations with fellow gardeners.

What is your favorite social, exercise, or other non-gardening activity?

I am active in the Sierra Club and spend a lot of time with my granddaughters. They have an interest in the environment and enjoy coming to the garden.

Q: How much water does my vegetable garden need?

A: Seeds and seedlings have different water needs. Seeds need to remain in moist soil to germinate, so you will need to water more frequently to ensure the soil does not dry. Seedlings need more moisture as well until they grow into mature plants. A full 16'x4' plot needs about 40 gallons of water per week, ideally applied over two separate waterings for mature plants. If you are hand watering, this is about one inch of water per week (or 1/2 inch per watering). You can use a rain gauge or a tuna can to help measure the water (or determine if the rain has done the watering for you). If you are using an irrigation system, you can use the "finger test" and some trial and error. Run your system for ten minutes and then wait ten minutes. Stick your index finger all the way into the soil next to one of your plants to check the moisture level. If it is saturated, that is enough water. If still dry, add five minutes of watering time until the soil is saturated.
