2007-It all started in our founder Bill West's backyard with a few members and a variety of experimental vegetable beds.

2008-Bill scouts the community for open land that could become a more permanent home for VISTA Gardens and finds 13572 South Village Drive. Bill convinces the County to let us lease the land to build a community garden.

2008-VISTA files Articles of Incorporation, adopts Bylaws, and receives its not for profit 501(c)(3) designation.

2014-After six years of tough work to clear the overgrown property and numerous meetings with the County, VISTA Gardens opens with just six plots and not much else except the little red shed, the well, a generator, some tools, tanks and hoses, and the gate and sign.

Looking at VISTA today with its 65 beds, a greenhouse, the pavilion, the pond, four pergolas, bee hives, and numerous beds filled with Florida native and wild flowers... it's hard to believe where we were back in 2014.

The Woodland Committee

began 2024 with the Tampa Bay Estuary mini-grant. We started wildflower seeds, with plans to plant later in the spring. The major focus of this month's effort is removing **Brazilian pepper**, an invasive tree that is crowding out native plants in the woodlands. With the help of enthusiastic and hard-working volunteers from Sickles High NHS, USF Rotaract and Hillsborough County master gardeners, we chopped, uprooted and dug up numerous trees.

Garden Committee Notes... Weeding

Help keep the garden beautiful. You are required to pull all the weeds around the outside of your bed. In addition, as part of your two-hour monthly commitment to VISTA, also help by pulling weeds in all the common areas (pathways, around the shed, etc.).

Signs

In order to help maintain the health of all the gardens, VISTA will begin putting little signs on any bed that needs specific attention. If you get a sign on your bed and need help, please do not hesitate to ask.

From the Herb Garden...

Looking for ways to add flair to your Valentine's Day cheese board? Look no further than VISTA's Herb Garden! Fresh Ladybird nasturtium blooms can be found in the pot next to the herb spiral and are both flavorful and flashy when paired with soft, white cheeses like goat cheese or brie. Combo any harder, aged cheeses like Parmesan or Gruvère with fresh sage and thyme, both of which can be found growing plentifully in the zone just north of the pergola. Compost Committee

The Compost Committee had a wonderful 2023 with a lot of kitchen refuse and oak leaves to help us successfully produce a bounty of "black gold" for our VISTA raised beds. New compost additions in February

Stay on the lookout for two new compost intake bins. Both will be metal trash cans to separately collect coffee grounds and eggshells. Please make sure eggshells are clean without any residual egg.

Black Gold availability

We have plenty of Black Gold for everyone to add to your raised beds. Two full yellow buckets for a 4 x 16 bed and one full yellow bucket for a half 4 x 8 bed. There is enough for social members, too, but you will need to supply your own bucket.

Some of our gardeners are experiencing tomato wilt, where the entire plant turns yellow and wilts. Occasionally the leaves will turn brown. There are so many answers online, it's hard to

know who to trust. Fortunately, we have experts to turn to at UF/IFAS Extension Hillsborough County. **Will Stone** shares that symptoms of Verticillium wilt and Fusarium wilt are similar but Fusarium is the more common wilt in our area. Both are caused by soil-borne pathogens. Verticillium wilt has dark brown to black streaks through the center of the stem when cut diagonally. When cut lengthways, stems show brown flecking of the inner tissues, rather than continuous browning which is associated with Fusarium wilt infected plants. (Those little millipedes you see in your garden are not causing wilt. They eat organic and dead plant material.) There are no chemical options available for Fusarium wilt. Best solution is to remove the infected plant with the roots (and make sure to clean your tools!), bag the plant and take it home to your own trash can. Luckily, once a plant is infected, it usually will not spread to another plant in the same growing season. Will suggests **this site** for reliable info.


VISTA Question & Answer

A: We know, this can be scary! For assistance, please contact Martin Kleiner, VISTA's Infrastructure Chair, at 813-404-3150.


New in the Little Free Library
